

The CharcuTOURie

This tour takes us through the fascinating world of agriculture, food production, and unique items you can put on your next charcuterie board, starting with Central Milling, Zollinger Fruit and Tree Farm, The Lavender Apple, and concluding at the Aggie Chocolate Factory.

<u>Central Milling</u> is deeply rooted in American farmland preservation and the tradition of providing high-quality flour and grains. With a history dating back over 150 years, *the Farmer*, the Miller, and the Baker work together to ensure the continuity of this essential staple in daily life. The Organic 6-Grain Pancake & Waffle Mix and the <u>Keith Giusto Bread Club</u> in Petaluma, CA (powered by Central Milling flour) are common gifts from Dr. Lawver!

• Please note: Since Central Milling is an active food facility, kindly leave purses, bags, or any personal items on the bus during the tour. Photography is encouraged. Additionally, wearing hair nets is mandatory, and individuals with long hair are encouraged to use ponytail holders for convenience.

The Zollinger Fruit and Tree Farm is a family-owned farm, established for almost 120 years. Originally focused on commercial fruit orchards, the farm now specializes in premium landscape trees. Their fruit production has narrowed down to apples and peaches. Don't miss the chance to savor a Zapple (carbonated apple) or indulge in fresh cider!

<u>The Lavender Apple</u> a quaint boutique farm, is dedicated to crafting small-batch products ranging from bath and body to home, health, and culinary items. Each creation is painstakingly handcrafted and meticulously inspected, ensuring an unparalleled lavender-infused experience. Treat yourself to the exquisite flavor of lavender-infused honey, made using local raw honey from Cache Valley..

Our journey continues to the <u>Aggie Chocolate Factory</u>, which opened its doors in 2018 is operated by USU's College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences. This facility serves as a unique learning and research center focused on chocolate science. The Aggie Chocolate Factory also plays a significant role in supporting the local confectionery industry by offering its expertise and facilities to both established and start-up businesses.

Each stop along our tour has items for sale, feel free to browse, purchase and take home some amazing Cache Valley products.

SPEAKERS



Dr. Ken White is the Vice President for Utah State University Extension, Dean of the College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences (CAAS), and Director of the Utah Agricultural Experiment Station. White has generated over \$17.3 million in extramural funding to support research in animal reproduction and embryonic development and has published over 100 peer-reviewed scientific articles and led the nuclear transfer team that produced the world's first cloned equines, three identical mule foals.



Dr. Kattlyn "Kat" Wolf is the Western Region American Association for Agricultural Education Vice President and Interim Department Head of the Agricultural Education, Leadership and Communications department at the University of Idaho. Dr. Wolf teaches undergraduate courses in agricultural education, communications, leadership, and supervises student teachers. Dr. Wolf's research interests include early career teacher and faculty self-efficacy, mentoring, and leadership.



Dr. Jonathan Velez, President of the American Association for Agricultural Education and Department Head for the Department of Agricultural Sciences and Agricultural Education at Oregon State University. Dr. Velez currently holds the Bradshaw Agricultural Sciences Leadership Education Endowment and oversees the OSU Leadership Minor. Dr. Velez teaches graduate and undergraduate leadership courses, and his research interests include motivation, teaching methods, leadership development, and effective leadership assessment methods.



Darren Parry is the former chairman and a current councilman for the Northwestern Band of the Shoshone Nation. He is the author of *The Bear River Massacre: A Shoshone History* and teaches Native American History at Utah State University. He is on numerous boards, including PBS Utah and Utah Humanities. In 2018, Darren raised over \$2 million to purchase land for his Tribe at the site of the Bear River Massacre—one of the deadliest massacre of Native people in U.S. history. Now he and his Tribe are working with scientists at Utah State University to restore the land. Darren is also continuing to raise money to build a cultural center on the land so the Northwestern Band of the Shoshone Nation can tell their story.
